Letter of wishes for the new Co-op Store in Kirkbymoorside

We would like to welcome the new Co-op store to Kirkbymoorside, and see this as an opportunity that can benefit all parties: customers, producers, town and the Co-op organisation, if it is done well

To this end, and in light of the recent government declaration of a Climate emergency, we would back calls from the community for this store to be a flagship for good environmental practice.

There are three parts to this request:

- 1) that the **building** be constructed to the highest environmental standards. This could include:
 - a) the use of less concrete
 - b) the use of recycled materials
 - c) the use of locally sourced materials
 - d) using the roof for generating renewable electricity with solar panels, maybe through working with the local solar co-op group, if incentives change to make this possible.
 - e) Installing either air source or ground source heat pumps
 - f) good insulation and heat exchange systems
 - g) that the fittings prioritise energy saving over increased sales, e.g. doors on fridges and freezers
 - h) that the shop uses smart technology where this will be environmentally advantageous
 - i) that there is 'grey water' collected for toilet flushing etc.
 - 2) That the co-op shop **engages with the community,** through continuing discussion, and by:
 - a) encouraging local producers to offer good for sale by having smaller tenders available.
 - b) empowering the local store manager to do some local purchasing.
 - c) continuing to host a cash machine
 - d) providing a local information advertising board
 - e) providing Bicycle Racks, plus electric bicycle charging points (maybe in conjunction with local council)
 - f) providing electric Car charging points, (again with local council)
 - g) working with local 'In bloom' group to make the store look great
 - h) engaging local builders to construct the store and fitting
 - i) engaging with local environment group, WRAP, school, and community groups to do food and healthy eating training and help to minimise waste.
 - j) Use signposting within the store to point out 'most needed' items for food banks
 - k) Use signposting and labelling to show food miles and seasonality.
 - 1) Provide a bus shelter/stop on site, working with local council.
 - m) Doing local deliveries with an electric bike.
 - n) Making the isles 'buggy' friendly, for both disabled and customers with small children
- 3) That the store commits to **reducing waste** drastically, of goods, packaging and energy, by:
 - a) having unwrapped fruit and veg, including 'wonky veg'
 - b) reducing food waste by making up boxes of fresh fruit and veg, near their sell by date, for reduced prices. Remaining veg to go to soup for food bank?
 - c) reduce packaging altogether.
 - d) all co-op produced plastic waste being recycled by the store, where council facilities do not exist
 - e) plastic bottle reverse vending machine to be installed
 - f) No single use plastic bags by 2020 in line with E.U. Targets.
 - g) Matching, and where possible, exceeding best practices from other stores
 - h) Reducing the food miles, even if it means reducing customer choice.
