new Traffic Regulations Orders will not now be considered unless there is a significant personal injury accident history... So, if your request came in today, we would have to say no.

As for your Traffic Regulation Order request, the consultation ended at the end of October. ...I found that there were a number of questions that the objectors had made that still needed answers. I am still waiting for some of those questions to be answered. Until I have all the necessary information, I am unable to complete the report. Indeed, some of the answers may influence the wording of the report, the final recommendation(s) and ultimately the extent and nature of the final Traffic Regulation Order, if in fact there is one at all.

Kirkbymoorside Town Brass Band celebrates 200 years of being Kirkby's band.

200 Years ago on the 10th of July 1815, twenty two days after the battle of Waterloo, the town of Kirkbymoorside purchased five instruments, a Serpent, two Bassoons, and two Horns for their band, to be the property of the inhabitants at large of the town of Kirkbymoorside. So for the next 200 years, the band, in all its forms, the town and people of Kirkbymoorside have been intrinsically linked.

The town providing essential support for the band and the band representing the town not only across the country but

internationally, teaching its residents to play and playing at town events from Armistice to town fairs, weddings and funerals.

To celebrate both the bi-centenary, and the town, the band commissioned Dr. Rodney Newton a world renowned composer, arranger, conductor, adjudicator and music journalist to write a piece of music, 'Chirchebi Tales' – a suite for brass band in five movements. "Chirchebi" is the name given to today's town of Kirkbymoorside in the Domesday Book.

John Woodward Musical Director says: "We are very proud to be Kirkby's town band. We wanted to do something for our bi-centenary that was a celebration of the town, an ultimate musical gift to the town from the band to say thank you for all the support they give us. We went to Dr Newton as he is world renowned across many musical genres and we knew the piece would be exceptional. He has however exceeded our expectations. The piece is awesome, he has captured the essence of Kirkbymoorside and district, produced a legacy for the town and an outstanding piece that will stand the critical examination of the brass band world."

The band welcomed Dr Rodney Newton and the Brass Band Press to the World Premier of the piece at a concert for the culmination of the bi-centenary celebrations on Sunday 14th June at Helmsley Art Centre.



Morsbags all over the world

Morsbags groups known as “pods” can be found all over the world. The Kirkbymoorside Pod is very grateful that to have use of the house at St Chad’s Church for meetings. Since the group started almost 2000 bags have been made. Morsbags are made from recycled fabric and given away free, to be used instead of plastic carrier bags.

If you need reasons to start using cloth shopping bags instead of plastic bags, here are just a few.

Over 500 billion plastic bags are used worldwide each year (so that’s about 70 plastic bags per person – if everyone had a few trusty morsbags to keep and use, problem solved!)

Retailers and governments are struggling to make the difference that is needed through taxes and bans, we the consumers need to take this into our own hands.

In some parts of the ocean there are six pounds of plastic for every pound of plankton.

Grants for Students and Apprentices

John Stockton, a Yeoman farmer, died in 1841 and left a sum of money in trust for the purpose of putting children to school to be taught and instructed in reading, writing and arithmetic in specified townships. Here we are some 174 years later still administering the Trust but moving on with the times and a revised scheme date 1958.

Today the Trust gives grants to students, usually at a degree level, and to apprentices, and covers such items as purchase of relevant books, stationery, equipment, fees and tools. To qualify applicants must have lived in the parishes below for a period of not less than 2 years and be under 25 years of age. Kirkbymoorside, Beadlam, Nawton, Welburn & Wombleton, Gillamoor, Fadmoor, Aislaby, Middleton, Wrelton, Cropton, Harome, Pockley, Appleton-le-Moors, Lastingham, Hutton le Hole, Spaunton, Farndale East & West, Normanby and Barughs Ambo, Great Edstone and Thornton Riseborough, Thornton Dale and Wilton.

Governors meet twice a year to consider applications. A simple application form can be obtained from the Clerk, Mrs Kendall, on 01439 771575 and she would be pleased to answer any questions.

Kirby Fruit Pickers, a success

This volunteer run project began almost 3 years ago with the aim of finding a use for surplus local fruit and raising some funds for community activities. The first year was a steep learning curve but then came the bumper harvest of 2013 when the group managed to stop over 2 tonnes of surplus fruit from going to waste.

Grants from the Town Council and a local fund made it possible to purchase very efficient juicing equipment to make local pressed apple juice, which is on sale at the Summit Bakery and Kirkby News.

Money raised from sales has been put to good use to help several community groups including The Junior Brass Band, Kirkby in Bloom and the Community First Responders.

Recently alongside juicing activities the group have held fruit tree grafting and pruning courses, and has begun looking at the history of fruit growing in the area. They have also begun to graft wood from old orchard trees in the town to develop a ‘living record’ of the apple varieties traditionally grown here.

SHORT STAY PARKING IN KIRKBYMOORSIDE TOWN CENTRE

Most people in the town would like to see a solution to the parking problems. At a meeting on 17th June 2013 the Town Council agreed to ask NYCC to consider implementing short stay parking restrictions in the centre of Kirkbymoorside.

On 11 September 2014 North Yorkshire County Council Highways department began consulting on limiting waiting in Market Place to two hours between the hours of 9am and 5pm from Monday to Saturday, with no return within 1 hour. Included in the order was a proposed loading bay on West End, outside the DIY shop, from 8:30am to 5pm, Monday to Friday and, the formalising of two bus stops on West End and West Fields from 7am to 7pm.

The consultation closed on 31st October 2014.

In June 2015 having received no information the Town Council pressed NYCC Highways for a report and received the following response

“... I regret to inform you that no such formal report will be produced. What I can say is that the process to get parking restrictions from initial request to “paint on the ground” is a long one. One major factor that can influence the timescales is the priority we assign to any such request. Shrinking budgets have put further burdens on staff and without a high priority, some schemes can be left for considerable periods whilst concerns of a higher priority take the available, limited, resources.

Since the Room was opened in 2014 it has been used by a variety of groups and has proved to be a popular venue, hosting birthday parties, exhibitions by The History Group, Kirkbymoorside & District Camera Club, Colin Pearsall and Dynamic Pictures by Polly Baldwin. During the summer it will be the venue for exhibitions by Maggie Roberts, Janet Poole and The History Group.

Everyone is very welcome and all admissions are free.

CanineWatch

The Canine Watch initiative launched in April has proved to be popular with interest spreading to Pockley, Sinnington and Rufforth. It is having a positive effect as

the number of complaints about dog fouling has significantly decreased following the increase in reports to the dog warden. Clearly the residents of Kirkbymoorside are finding their voices! If you wish to join the initiative you can sign up at the Library, Scallywags or the Town Council office. By being part of the Group you can report an incident of dog fouling knowing that you have the support of like-minded individuals. All you need to do is display the Canine Watch symbol in your window to indicate you support the initiative and with other members you are prepared to report the offenders and ensure that the streets and footpaths of Kirkbymoorside are kept ‘foul free’.
