The annual Community Awards provide an opportunity to acknowledge the positive contributions of individuals and groups locally. Nominations are made by members of the community to acknowledge the contribution of fellow members of the community.

This year's Community Awards were very generously sponsored by Rack Systems Engineering Ltd and Marshall Slingsby Advanced Composites, to whom the Town Council extend enormous thanks. The awards presentation took place on Saturday 27th September in the Memorial Hall. The proceedings began with a wonderful programme of music performed by Kirkbymoorside Town Brass Band. The ceremony was hosted by Angus Ashworth of Ryedale Auctioneers and awards presented by the Town Mayor, Joe Coughlan. There were three categories of awards, 'Voluntary/charity/membership Organisation', Individual or 'Quiet Contributor' and Young Person. Two additional awards were also presented, the Town Council's Award for outstanding contributions to the Community of Kirkbymoorside, and a Special Recognition Award.

VOLUNTARY / CHARITY / MEMBERSHIP ORGANISATION OF THE YEAR

There were many deserving nominations for the 'Voluntary / Charity / Membership Organisation of the Year' and the judges had a difficult job selecting the three shortlisted nominees:

Kirkbymoorside Armed Forces & Veterans Breakfast Club In the wake of the devastating floods brought by Storm Darragh in December 2024, the very newly formed Kirkbymoorside Armed Forces & Veterans Breakfast Club rallied round to support those affected and assist with the emergency flood response efforts.


Kirkbymoorside In Bloom For the team's fabulous floral displays that promote the town, provide environmental benefits and improve the wellbeing of residents and visitors alike.

The Individual or 'Quiet Contributor' of the Year is about the unsung heroes, those individuals that go the extra mile to help others and make such a positive contribution to our community. This year's shortlisted nominees were:

Andy Carnall for his active participation in the flood response efforts following Storm Darragh in December 2024 and considerable involvement in arrangements for the Kirkbymoorside Music Festival 2025. Now a member of the Memorial Hall Committee, he is working hard fundraising.

Dee Dowkes has been cataloguing her rambles throughout and around Kirkbymoorside for many years. She has chronicled the landscape, its history and heritage in photographs and words. She shares her observations on social media for others to enjoy, reminisce or follow in her footsteps, keeping memories alive.

Linda Knight is committed to supporting the Kirkbymoorside community library and has adopted the role of leadership, applying for grants and raising funds, organising the volunteers, making the library a successful venue and a welcoming community space. She was also actively involved in setting up the recently constituted Kirkbymoorside Community Support Group.

She helps plan and run meetings, trips and holidays to ensure each young individual achieves their potential and encourages girls with life skills and independence. Her help was invaluable at the last division Guide camp this summer where she organised the menu shopped and catered for 55 people for 4 days!

Lizzie is a very committed young woman setting a great example to all members of Girl Guiding. She shows a quiet confidence and is currently working to achieve her Queens Guide Award which is very challenging without the extra commitment of weekly meetings and holidays.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

In her role as lead of the recently constituted Kirkbymoorside Community Support Group she has successfully applied for a substantial amount for grant funding for the multi-faceted project to promote Kirkbymoorside.

TOWN COUNCIL GRANTS & CONTRIBUTIONS

The Town Council aims to support as many local groups and initiatives as possible and has a modest budget each year to do so. So far this year the Town Council has contributed to the following: £800 to Next Steps' for their walk & talk therapy sessions in Kirkbymoorside; £800 to Friends of Kirkbymoorside Community Primary School towards the 2025 Wow! Day expenses; £1764 to upgrade the flood lights at the Bowling Club; £419 for traffic management costs associated with the Town Band's 'Bandamonium' event.

Every year the Town Council also commits to expenses associated with local initiatives and events that benefit the community. These include support of *In Bloom* with a £90 contribution towards the cost of maintaining the planting around the war memorial in All Saint's churchyard, as well as all costs associated with the hanging baskets. These include the cost of planting, installation, watering and then removal and storage, @ £2400 per year.

Provision is also made to cover the cost of traffic management for the annual 10k event @ £1,458 and Remembrance Day Parade @ £568.
