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### STATUS AND CHARITABLE OBJECT

Ryedale Community Transport (formerly Ryecat Limited) officially converted to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) on 11 November 2019. This means the charity is no longer registered at Companies House but reports directly to the Charities Commission for England and Wales. The Charity is still the same entity and has the same charity number 1109232 (registered as a charity since 26 April 2005). The Charitable Incorporated Organisation was established by a Constitution adopted on the date of changeover and replaces the Memorandum of Association.

The object of the Charitable Organisation is to provide a community transport service for such of the inhabitants of Ryedale, Scarborough & Whitby and Selby Districts of North Yorkshire and of the City of York, who are in need of such service because of age, sickness or disability (mental or physical), or poverty, or because of lack of availability of adequate and safe public transport services.

Ryedale Community Transport CIO provides various community transport options for the residents of Ryedale including: Ryedale Volunteer Car Scheme, Wheelchair Accessible Travel, Minibus Travel, Wheels2Work Moped Hire and MiDAS training.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT For the Year Ended 31st march 2019

The Trustees present their annual report with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 March 2019.

The financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice for Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the financial reporting standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) and with the charity's governing documents.

### **GOVERNANCE**

The Board of Trustees met regularly during the year and members have a background of differing special interests in transport activities and hence bring a variety of relevant qualities to the Board membership.

The staffing structure during the year comprised the Chief Officer, Ken Gill; a Finance Manager; a Wheels2Work Co-Ordinator; two part-time Car Scheme Booking Co-Ordinators; ten paid minibus drivers, two passenger assistants and an Administrator. Volunteers continue to donate valuable additional resources, both in administration of the organisation and as volunteer drivers.

### SERVICE OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Ryedale Car Scheme was established in 1989 and has steadily grown over the years to become one of the largest car schemes in North Yorkshire. This was set up to provide transport, through recruitment and support of volunteer drivers, for people who do not have access to other means of transport. The car scheme continues to meet more than 90% of all requests for transport, although maintaining this level is not an easy task and alternative modes of travel are always under consideration. The membership at the year end stood at 710.

The strategy for the Car Scheme is to continue delivering high quality, affordable, often essential, transport provision for those people who are only suited to personal door-to-door transport, in order to access health related and other personal appointments. We are continuing to operate a trial contract with the NHS Scarborough and Ryedale Clinical Commissioning Group to provide a rural transport service to aid healthcare appointments in the area of Ampleforth & Hovingham.

Ring & Ride a demand responsive service which operated with a wheelchair accessible vehicle in the towns of Malton and Norton. This service helped to release car scheme drivers from some of the requested short journeys, enabling them to take on more of the longer trips to local and regional health services. Unfortunately this service ceased on 30 June 2018, as RCT were unable to secure new funding to replace the lottery funding which came to an end in June.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT (Continued) For the Year Ended 31st march 2019

<u>Fleet Travel</u> is an expansion of Group Travel (first launched in April 2002). Group Travel provided community groups with access to minibuses for their travel needs. The new project provides minibus and wheelchair accessible car (WAV) transport services for individuals, voluntary organisations and community groups at affordable rates. RCT currently operates one wheelchair accessible low-floor bus, one accessible minibus with lift, five regular minibuses and six wheelchair accessible cars. These vehicles are available for hire with a driver or as self drive.

NYCC Contracted Home to School and Special Needs Education services, as well as Scheduled Bus Routes, provide a regular income stream. These contracts provide an essential contribution to overheads and enable the resources of RCT to be more resilient to change.

Wheels to Work was launched in July 2002 to provide a moped loan scheme to people who experience difficulty in accessing employment, education or training. There is currently no upper age limit for eligibility to access this service. This scheme is able to continue as a result of the generosity of Ryedale District Council which, in difficult financial circumstances, continues to grant fund the scheme. The Wheels to Work fleet currently stands at 22 vehicles located in Ryedale, the Borough of Scarborough, the City of York and the Selby District. Potential hirers may be referred by employers, further education providers or other related agencies. In all four districts, the established scheme has a high proportion of self-referrals from potential riders, along with agencies such as Jobcentre Plus. All clients must hold a provisional driving licence and a CBT (Compulsory Basic Training) certificate, which can be organised by the project co-ordinator. An estimated 10,000 journeys are undertaken per year, based on an assumption of two journeys per day, to work or training/education and back, five days per week.

<u>Driver Training and Assessment MiDAS</u> (Minibus Driver Assessment) were delivered in-house by the Chief Officer. As a matter of good practice, all the paid and voluntary minibus drivers undergo this assessment before they take passengers for Ryedale Community Transport work. All drivers whether voluntary or paid are DBS checked. The Chief Officer hold courses for external clients at a small cost.

RYECAT Enterprises Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Charity. It was established on the 8 February 2007. Ryecat Enterprises operated as the social trading arm of the Charity. The company is no longer trading.

### FINANCIAL RESULTS

This year's surplus of £88,831 comprises an operational surplus of £20,295, before transfer between funds, capital funding received of £105,000 and a depreciation charge of £36,464. The capital funding has been used in the year to purchase new vehicles. The grant income is shown in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) in the year and the expenditure is on the Balance Sheet within fixed assets. The balance on these vehicles will be reduced by depreciation over the assets useful economic life.

£15,500 of the Designated Fund together with the surplus from operations was used in the year to purchase new vehicles and fund the construction of a much needed meeting/training room.

The Balance Sheet at 31 March 2019 shows total funds of £345,415, which include £168,253 tangible fixed assets and a bank balance of £169,264. The funds are detailed further in note 22 to the accounts.

A breakdown of the restricted funds, showing movements in year by project and closing balances at 31 March 2019 is shown in note 18 to the accounts.

### RISK ANALYSIS

The Department of Transport issued a letter in July 2017 outlining changes to section 19 and 22 permits. RCT uses these permits to operate the home to school transport and scheduled bus services. A consultation has been taking place since 2018 by the Department for Transport and the outcome of that consultation may mean that RCT can no longer bid for contracts in the usual way which will mean the loss of a valuable regular income stream. A decision effecting all CT organisations is still awaited but in the meantime RCT are still operating its home to school contracts and scheduled bus services as normal. These contracts are all up for renewal in April 2020.

Funding for the Car scheme and Ring & Ride service from the Lottery Fund ended in June 2018. Since then the Ring & Ride Service has ceased to operate and RCT has expanded the Group Travel service (now Fleet Travel) to incorporate Wheelchair Accessible Car transport.

### FUTURE STRATEGY

As a result of increased risk and fallout of the Lottery Grant, the Trustees commenced a review of operations in February 2018 and agreed a new Business Plan and four year financial strategy in December 2018. The plan looks outwards to the community with the objective of becoming more sustainable, seeking new business and experimenting with new ideas to help the community with mobility.

Ryedale Community Transport CIO is the sole community transport organisation serving the Ryedale District. Ryedale Community Transport CIO provides a support system for smaller community transport providers and underpins the delivery of the NYCC strategy.

### RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees consider that (unrestricted) cash reserves are required for the following reasons:

- \* To enable Ryedale Community Transport CIO to maintain essential core functions for a period of twelve months and have time to adjust in the event of a significant reduction in anticipated or budgeted income streams, or in the event of a major shift in the pattern of activities.
- \* To provide for unfunded staffing-related costs and for unforeseen compliance costs arising from existing or new legislation and regulations.
- \* To provide funds of last resort in the event of unavoidable cost overruns on activities that cannot be met from restricted funds.
- \* To provide the ability to commission research and development work in the community, to pump-prime new projects and to maintain project continuity in the event of limited short-term funding gaps.
- \* To provide a source of working capital to fund additions and renewals to infrastructure and accommodation, and to provide the means of managing short term cash flow fluctuations. The value of reserves required to meet these risks is estimated at £150,000.

### FUNDING

Funding comes from two main sources; grants and contractual payments from statutory bodies and fees and charges to service users. A high proportion of funds has been received from statutory bodies; mainly The Lottery Fund, Ryedale District Council and North Yorkshire County Council.

Trustees are appreciative of the funding received from statutory bodies and the confidence in Ryedale Community Transport that this implies. Nonetheless it is felt that Ryedale Community Transport should continue to seek to increase generated income as well as the amount of funding it receives from alternative sources such as charitable trusts and from individuals, groups and firms locally, to help spread the financial risk.

The Trustees wish to thank Ryedale District Council, The Joseph Rowntree Foundation, North Yorkshire County Council, The Wilfred Jackson (Deceased) Will Trust, NJS Creative Ltd and the National Lottery for Grant support during 2018/19. A special thank you to the Kirkby Foundation for the funding of a Wheelchair Accessible Car in April 2018 and The Garfield Weston Foundation for funding three brand new Wheelchair Accessible Cars in November 2018. The Trustees would also like to say a big thank you to the Malton Estates and everyone who made a donation to the Charity in 2018/19 your kind donations help to keep the charity and all its services running.

### RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

Company Law requires Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which gives a true and fair view of the affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources for that year. In preparing these accounts the trustees are required to:

- \* select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;

- \* prepare the financial statements on the 'going concern' basis, unless it is appropriate to presume that the charity will continue its activities.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2019

### 1 BASIS OF PREPARATION

### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) and with the Charities Act 2011.

### Fund accounting

- \* Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
- \* Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Board of Trustees for a particular purposes. In the case of RCT they are earmarked for Asset Replacement.
- \* Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.

### 2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year.

### 2.1 RECONCILIATION WITH PREVIOUS GENERALLY ACCEPTED ACCOUNTING PRACTICE

In preparing the accounts for 2018-19 to apply the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 it was identified that no restatement of comparative items was required.

### 2.2 INCOME

Income represents resources received in the form of grants, donations and contractual payments to support and promote an effective voluntary sector, and to fund direct charitable activities. The following policies are applied to particular categories of income.

### Recognition of income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- \* the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- \* it is more likely than not that the charity will receive the resources; and
- \* the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2019

### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES Continued**

### **Offsetting**

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by FRS102 SORP.

### Grants and donations

Grants and donations are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the general income recognition criteria have been met. In the case of performance related grants, income is only recognised in the SoFA when the performance related conditions have been met.

### Legacies

Legacies are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) in the year of receipt.

### Government grants

The charity has received government grants in the reporting period.

### Tax reclaims on donations and gifts

Gift Aid receivable is included in income when there is a valid declaration from the donor. Any Gift Aid amount recovered on a donation is considered to be part of that gift and is treated as an addition to the same fund as the initial donation.

### Contractual income

Contractual income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) once the goods or service have been provided.

### Income from interest

Interest is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

### Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions are received in the nature of a gift and are recognised in Donations and Legacies.

### Settlement of insurance claims

Insurance claims are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the general income recognition criteria have been met and are included as an item of other income.

### 2.3 EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

### Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised in the period in which they are incurred, where there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty. The expenditure is allocated to the particular activity to which the cost relates. Expenditure that includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

### Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support. Governance costs comprise those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Support costs include central functions and are allocated on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resources. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly; others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. Agreed percentage based on use of resources as set out in Note 4.

Employment costs have been allocated on the basis of time spent. Other costs have been allocated wherever possible on an actual basis, otherwise in proportion to relevant staff hours.

### Redundancy

The charity made two redundancy payments during the reporting period, which are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA).

### **Pension**

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme. Contributions payable for the year are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA).

### Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred over the term of the lease.

### Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation, resulting from a past event, that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

### 2.4 ASSETS

### Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets (excluding investments) are stated at a cost less accumulated depreciation. Costs of minor additions are not capitalised. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost of each asset over its estimated useful life: -

### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

### Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### **Debtors**

Trade and other debtors have been measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discounts due.

### Deferred income

### 9 TRANSACTIONS WITH TRUSTEES

The charity trustees were not paid or received any other benefits from employment with the charity or its subsidiary in the year (2018 - £nil). No charity trustee received payment for professional or other services supplied to the charity (2018-£nil). Travel expenses amounting to £335 (2018 - £566) were reimbursed to 2 (2018 - 2) members of the board of trustees for their role as administration volunteers/trustees.

During the year 2 members of the board of trustees (2018 - 2) were actively involved as volunteer drivers on the Car Scheme. Volunteer drivers receive reimbursement at 45p per mile from the car scheme members for their journeys.

### 10 DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PENSION SCHEME

The company operates defined contribution pension schemes on behalf of its employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company in independently administered funds. The total charge included in the accounts amounts to £5,970 (2018 - £6,933). At the balance sheet date there were owing contributions of £319 (2018 - £517).

Pension expenses relating to staff allocated to a particular activity have been allocated directly to that activity. Pension expenses relating to management and administration support costs have been allocated using an agreed percentage based on the usage of resources.

### Restricted Funds

Ryedale Volunteer Car Scheme - set up to provide transport, through recruitment and support of volunteer drivers, for people who do not have access to other means of transport. Funding is received from the National Lottery Fund and North Yorkshire County Council, with additional income received through NHS contracts, other grant funding, voluntary donations and registration fees. Costs recovered from voluntary and statutory organisations making use of the service are also credited to the fund.

<u>Wheels to Work</u> - is a fund to develop and operate a scheme of leasing mopeds to people who are experiencing difficulty with access to work, training, volunteering or college, because of the lack of suitable public or private transport. The scheme is supported by Ryedale District Council, North Yorkshire Council, other grant funding and hire charges from users.

Ring & Ride Service - was supported by the National Lottery Fund and North Yorkshire County Council with additional income received through passenger fares. The Big Lottery Grant funding ended on 30 June 2018 and after that date that date the service ceased. It has been replaced by an on demand transport service in Wheelchair Accessible Cars (WAVs).

<u>WAV</u> <u>Development Fund</u> - is a fund to develop a small fleet of wheelchair accessible cars in order to provide an accessible transport service to local groups and residents of Ryedale and the City of York. Five vehicles have been purchased with Funding from The Garfield Weston Foundation, The Kirkby Foundation and through a legacy from the estate of the late Alan Smith. Funding received from NYCC has supported the scheme in its first year. The balance on this fund represents the written down value of the five vehicles.

<u>RDC</u> core <u>funding</u> - Ryedale District Council continues to support Ryedale Community Transport via its Voluntary Sector Agreement which provides a grant towards core funding of the organisation. The largest proportion of this supports the delivery of the Wheels to Work moped loan scheme for Ryedale. The balance of the grant supports the core administration of the other services provided by Ryedale Community Transport for the benefit of Ryedale. residents.

### 18 MOVEMENTS IN CHARITY FUNDS continued

### Unrestricted Funds

<u>Designated fund</u> - The replacement of vehicles and computer equipment is essential for the continuation of Ryedale Community Transport's operations, so a proportion of the charity's general reserves has been earmarked for the replacement of assets.

<u>General fund</u> - This is the 'free reserves' after allowing for the designated fund. The operations carried out under the general fund are fleet operations. This comprises of Home to School Contracts, Scheduled Bus Services, MiDAS training, Group Travel, Individual Travel and Self drive hire. All carried out using RCTs fleet of Minibuses and Wheelchairs Accessible Cars.
